3. Issues and Policy

10. As a candidate, what are your top three education policy issues? (100 words or less)

First and foremost is making our children and their educations a priority. It is our duty to promptly and safely implement a plan to keep children in the classroom. Second is the recent loss of teachers we have experienced (especially in the SPED program). We need a comprehensive staffing and pay analysis to determine the number of educators we need to recruit. We must compare our pay scale to neighboring districts so our district is attractive to quality educators to keep them here where they are needed. Finally, we must keep politics out of our schools and focus on education.

11. The Kansas Supreme Court ruled the current K-12 education funding formula is both equitable and adequate. The Court, however, has retained jurisdiction over the case to assure funding is maintained. What are your thoughts on the formula and additional funding that has been added? (100 words or less)

I fully support the ruling from the Kansas Supreme Court. The future of our state and our local communities lies with the quality of education we provide our children. Adequate funding is the cornerstone for providing that education. Underpaid educators create a staffing loss due to them leaving our district. A lack of educators leads to overcrowded classrooms which creates less focus on our children and their individual needs.

12. The K-12 education system requires accountability measures for student performance, which have sometimes been a source of debate. Please describe the accountability measures you support and believe are accurately reflective of student achievement. (100 words or less)

The MAP scores are a good measure of academic progress and the data provided to parents is easily comprehensible. The standard grading system and GPA used in the upper levels of our district provides an easily understandable reflection of our children's academic achievements. The system used in the lower elementary levels does not reflect where the children's academic level truly is.

13. Kansas is experiencing low unemployment rates and employers are struggling to find qualified workers, especially in technical and skilled trades. How do you see the school district helping to meet the business community's future workforce needs through technical education and training? (100 words or less)

Our district currently provides exceptional technical education training. Not every kid is destined for college and not every career choice requires higher education. The simple answer is service. I have spoken to my wife often over the years of continuing my service to the community either through school board or city council. As it played out, my retirement from the Sheriff's Office fell in line with this election. I witnessed the division and turmoil in our town that carried out over the last year. The district was thrown a curveball with the Covid pandemic. I feel through my years of experience responding to, handling and leading the processing of critical incidents I bring an extraordinary skill set to this position.
