I am optimistic that we are finally headed in the right direction with adequately funding schools in Kansas. The Kansas Supreme Court wisely retained jurisdiction in this matter because many in the Kansas Legislature have a history of routinely working to underfund (and at times undermine) our public schools for the past two decades. The Constitution of the State of Kansas is clear about the role of the State in providing adequate and equitable public education. We can afford what we prioritize. Our community members realize that strong public schools drive strong local economies.

12. The K-12 education system requires accountability measures for student performance, focused on post-secondary success and career-readiness. Do you believe the District is meeting expectations for student achievement? (100 words or less)

Here in Olathe, we have a history of setting high expectations to prepare each student for their future. Teachers meet every student where they are & strive to personalize learning. The district has a 92.1% graduation rate (compared to 87.2% statewide). There are many methods to measure student achievement. While standardized test data is one piece of the puzzle, it is an incomplete picture of the whole learner. Our Portrait of a Graduate initiative helps to begin with the end in mind. This new approach emphasizing a variety of competencies is an excellent way to approach teaching and learning.

13. Kansas is experiencing low unemployment rates and employers are struggling to find qualified workers. How do you see the school district helping to meet the business community's future workforce needs through work-based learning such as internships, training, and other career exploration opportunities? Olathe School District does a great job of fostering a climate of involvement, interaction and respect between the City Council and school leaders, as well as business partners in the community.
